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## Pepperdean Ponderings

This month I'd like to discuss using the internet to promote our Pods and cookoffs. Three very simple strategies can be easily employed to aid our cause. I'm going to suggest using email distribution groups, websites, and internet mailing lists to increase Pod membership and boost attendance at cookoffs.

When I first became Great Pepper of the Mason Dixon Pod, Ifelt we needed to biild if stronger tense of community among the cooks who regularly participate in cookoffs in the East. We also needed a way to easily promote our cookoffs to them. I began to gather email addresses and place them into a single distribution group in my address book. As this list began to grow, I felt we had discovered a powerful promotional tool. I began to email announcements and reminders for cookoffs. Before long it was unnecessary to print flyers and mail them to cooks. We saved money on printing and postage while gaining the advantage of getting instant responses from cooks and being able to provide them with important information.

This, however, was just the beginning for this dynamic tool. The mailing list began to grow with email addresses of additional cooks, judges, chili friends, and spectators. Soon we were sharing cookoff information and news about members of our e-community on a regular basis. The regular cyber-visiting has encouraged friends to judge, judges to cook, brought us new cookoffs, and generally raised the CASI energy level in this neck of the woods.

Second, consider building a website for your Pod. It's really very easy and can give you a great deal of visibility. In a recent three month period, the Mason Dixon Pod website had 6000 visitors. We've added new Pod members and new chili cooks from spicy food fans who were surfing the internet. They printed out the membership form, completed it, and forwarded it to us with their check. We've received many emails requesting directions to cookoffs from folks who saw our online schedule. And (no kidding) just a minute ago as I sat here working on this article, my computer beeped me advising there was a new email. I checked it, and it's someone who clicked the email link on our website who would like us to help their organization put on a CASI cookoff.

Now I mean it when I say it's easy to build a website. I work as a music teacher and Realtor - not a computer professional. However, I think designing web pages is easy and fun. Almost anyone with internet access can host your Pod website. Another important fact is that it's FREE. Most internet service providers provide personal web space to their customers. To make it easy for members of their communities to get online, they even provide an array of fill-in-the-blank templates for you to use. You simply choose the style you like, type in the appropriate information, maybe choose a picture or two, and BAM!, you've got a website. Some free web-hosting services, like Tripod.com, have on-line hints and tips for making your website more interesting.

If you're in a more creative frame of mind, you can use programs like Microsoft's Front Page to build your web pages. Front Page is similar to a standard word processor with many effects to make your site appealing. You don't need any knowledge of HTML. All you need is the vision to organize the look of your page. If you want to be a truly artistic site creator, there are programs like Ulead Photolmpact and Adobe Photoshop that allow you to build whatever you can imagine.

All of the elaborate designing, however, is unnecessary. The most important thing is that while the sky's the limit
for what you might create, getting your Pod or cookoff online is quick, simple, free, and provides a very effective source of promotion.

The third means of getting the word out about your events is through the discussion on the chile-heads mailing list. Discussion groups, or listserv groups, are similar to newsgroups and are formed for the discussion of a particular topic. They differ from newsgroups, because the discussion is carried on through emails that are broadcast to the entire community of pubscribers with gimitar interests.

The chile-heads mailing list is maintained for all discussions of growing, cooking, and eating chile peppers, spicy foods, and general braggadocio of the 'I can eat it hotter than you can' variety. I used to post notices about CASI cookoffs I would be attending and invite chile-heads to come say hello. Through these invitations, I was able to create a mutually beneficial relationship between folks who loved to eat spicy food and those of us who like to serve it up to appreciative eaters. A number of these chile-heads have become cooks and judges in our cookoffs. There are approximately 2000 chile-headmembers worldwide.

Another activity chile-heads are famous for is the hotluck. If you saw the Food TV Network show "Eat The Heat", you might know that a hotluck is just a potluck party for chileheads where everyone brings their spicy specialty to contribute. We expanded the scope of a couple of our cookoffs by hosting a hotluck in conjunction with the cookoff. The chile-heads and their families provided extra spectators and a chance to sample delights like Red Savina bread and mango-jalapeno ice cream. ## The Tejas Medicineman Presents Chili Chants

Last month we began the discussion about what makes a good chili cooking pot. Before we progress, I might mention another thing about not using your chili pot for anything other than cooking chili

One of the oldest codes of hygiene in the world came from Moses time when every household possessed special cooking utensils. Each family unit would carry a set of cooking bowls. Each of the bowls was used to cook only one type of food. Mutton was cooked in a separate bowl from beef, as well as fish and fowl, which kept the flavors from being tainted by cross contamination of elements being cooked. Historians still wonder who originated all those scientific hygienic laws for early man that are still valid in this'century. More on chili cooking hygiene later now back to pots.

What makes a good chili cooking pot? Anyone can go down to a local store and buy a cheap, thin, stainless steel stock pot and cook up a batch of chili. How well it turns ou will either be pure luck or the cook would be like a test pilot who can fly (cook) anything they put their mind to. I have seen many sad disasters when a new cooking team would buy a thin cheap pot, put it on a blowtorch burner and ruin a pot of chili in 10 minutes by burning the chili across the bottom of the pot. So, lets talk about the best pot from the bottom up.

Previously we mentioned that most of the pots are still made with aluminum but are coated with a tough hide of space age material - Teflon or other proprietary name - or even baked enamel. The purpose of course is to prevent interaction with the food and the aluminum. The thickness of the aluminum portion of the pot changes the cooking characteristics. The thicker the bottom and walls, the more heat is distributed evenly around the surface of the contents being cooked. There is one brand that has a uniform thickness over the entire pot. Some people like this style, but it is the next to lowest rated of the pots.

The next type is the pot with a thick bottom and thinner sides. The thick bottom allows a small amount of flame to disperse the heat evenly across the entire bottom of the pot to prevent scorching of the bottom of the cooking area. The best pots will have a sandwiched piece of copper plate in the bottom. This is where the war of opinions really begins about who is cooking with the best pot.

Some cook with all glass pots, some with coated all aluminum, and others cook with stainless steel. Remember, we have not discussed the tops as of yet. Glass pots were a great novelty. They distributed heat well, but those of us who weathered the Corning Ware wars and keeping them clean steered clear of them. The coated aluminum pot has its merits, but it loses because, well, it's "ugly". The sleek stainless pot just looks like a quality cooking utensil. So, now you have a pretty, functional stainless cooking pot.

What makes or breaks a pot as a winner is the lid. The best lid is dome shaped and has a lip that curls under and seats within the pot rim. Other lids that sit in a slot and have a flat lip that sits on the top of the rim allow too much steam and flavor out of the pot. So, which pots win by having all the best elements? Chantal and Tools of the Trade. Both are stainless with copper core bottoms and dome curved lids. The Chantal offers a see thru top with the incurved metal rim. These pots are expensive, but the cooking results are worth it. There will be some world champions who will contest me on these thoughts, but like I mentioned, those are the ones who are the "test pilots" who can fly (cook) anything

## A VIEW FROM THE TOP OF AN OLD CHILIHEAD

While sitting and waiting for my chili to cook at the Mexico International Cookoff, I started thinking about what I was going to write for this March issue of the Trails. As I was reminiscing and sipping a cold one several people came over and asked me questions about the history of this cookoff.
Having been over served for three straight days I was thinking a little slow when it dawned on me that the cooks had given me the subject of this article. I will share with you some of the experiences over the years that have taken place in this cookoff's history.

These will be out of chronological order and without backup documentation so it will not be a true history. I mention this because I don't want the history majors out there to get their knickers in a knot. These are some amusing experiences I recall from first hand observation.

The Mexico Chili Cookoff started in Guadalajara about 1976. It was not an International cookoff at that time. It was a promotional trip put together by Nancy Becker from San Marcos. In 1977 Vann York won the cookoff. Not having his six points to cook in Terlingua, he called Frank Tolbert and got it made an International so he could qualify to cook in Terlingua. I remember some of the winners but don't know the year they won.
Ann Angel won one year and they threw her in the pool. Then some of the drunk chili cooks decided she might drown and they started jumping in to rescue her. Ann, 1 think, was an Olympic swimmer once upon a time. Needless to say she needed no help! But, we had hell getting some of her drunk rescuers out of the water. Luckily, none of them drowned. That was the beginning of being thrown in the pool if you won in Guadalajara not the one in Nuevo Laredo. The one in Laredo came about in an entirely different way. I'm not going to mention the lady's name because I don't want to embarrass her. This lady won the cookoff and got so excited she wet her pants. To try and hide what had happened she jumped in the pool. That was the beginning of the winners going in the pool in Laredo. We Chiliheads do have some great traditions, don't we.

Back to El Tapatio in Guadalajara. The hotel had a sauna with a coal burning grill in the middle. The grill had a grate on top. Richard Horton had been told by his wife to quit drinking and stay in his room. Did he? Of course not. As soon as his wife was out of sight Richard decided to go to the sauna to sweat some of those impurities out of his body. He stumbled on the grill with his bare butt and it looked like he had stuck it in a waffle iron. This man was in pain. Was that his biggest concern? No. All he was worried about was that there was no way he could hide it from Joanne. Everyone has their own idea of pain.

One year Duffy Duffield won Guadalajara. Yes, Duffy used to cook chili. He cooked in Terlingua and I think won fifth place that year. Duff, Irene, Judie and I had been to England and Scotland on a three week vacation a short time before the cookoff and I had bought a quart of Bell's Scotch. I took it to Mexico. I gave it to Duff in the pool and he and Pat Irvine drank the whole thing. They were totally destroyed, physically and mentally. We were having a party in someone's room that night and Duff curled up in the closet and went to sleep. Pat went to her room and went to bed and locked herself in and had the key to the room with her also. Mom Roth had gone with her to Mexico and could not get in the room and we could not wake her up. The hotel could not get in with their pass key
because the doors were bolted from the inside. I can't remember where Mom finally spent the night. On the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat.

One year Judie King won the cookoff. I rented a horse from the security guard and put Judie on the horse. She was holding on like she was on a roller coaster. I led the horse and Judie into Bob Coat's room and tried to get the horse to take a big dump. He wouldn't do it. I gave up trying to train horses after that.

Guadalajara finally ran its course and there was not a Mexico Cookoff for several years. Then about eighteen years ago Larry and Janie Burruss and Bubba Reinke put together a new cookoff in Mexico. We took buses to Piedras Negras Mexico and stayed in a new hotel. It was a great cookoff because we did not cook chili. We just partied. The CASI swim team was formed at that cookoff. I don't think we ever had a captain. Skinny dipping in thirty degree weather is not smart. During that time you never saw Barbara Fox without a camera in her hand. She had a Polaroid and took a lot of pictures of drunks in the ladies rest room. There was not a chilihead there who could tear up a Polaroid picture. Most of us did not smoke so we couldn't burn them and those table knives in the restaurant will not cut those babies up either. Thanks Barbie.

The following year we went to Laredo to the Hacienda and had a cookoff. I won that year but it wasn't until the next year that it was designated as the Mexico International. There are a hundred more stories I could tell about Mexico, but space is limited in these articles. Someday, bring a case of beer and we will gather around a campfire and reminisce aboūt the old days.

This year we had eleven contestants, five of which were women. We line our contestants up on stage and then run then through the contest one at a time. At each contestants turn we allow about a minute worth of intro. I try to prompt them into humorous statements about why they are doing this, like how this is their one shot for fame, or that they hope that it will improve their sex life. Whatever. Then we give the contestant a plate of Jalapeno Peppers. He or she has one minute to shovel as many peppers into their mouths as they can. With fifteen seconds to go we countdown the time so they can packed their mouths as full as they want. The later contestants have a limited advantage with this as they know what their predecessors did. But for the most part people don't want to wimp out in front of the crowd so they just jam as many into their mouths as they can. They finally have one additional minute to swallow everything in their mouths and they must keep it down. The event takes about 40 minutes to run. I figure that this is a good way to spend a Saturday afternoon.

As stated previously we had a repeat winner this year. Harry Fribig won last year and this year did it again. As an observation a lot of people have trouble trying to cram a bunch of peppers down their throats. They seem to pack their mouths and then have to pause to swallow or gasp for air. Harry on the other hand seems smooth and steady in chewing and swallowing the peppers. It might just be genetics though as his daughter enter the contest and did at least eleven.
