CASA Pod Helps Fire Victims

For those of you who don't know, the Rodeo-Chediski fire in late June and early July ravaged over 470,000 acres of eastern Arizona.

About a week after the Rodeo-Chediski fire started, thousands of people were evacuated from their homes. Dennis Huff, a Chili Appreciation Society of Arizona (CASA) member, came up with an idea to help by cooking a lunch for all the evacuees. His idea was to solicit donations for food and money to accumulate enough food to feed 1,000 people for lunch.

Dennis worked through many obstacles but finally got everything coordinated for the CASA volunteers to go to the fire area and cook for these displaced people. Several CASA members received donations from their companies and were also able to get food donated.

The site for the "CASA Lunch" was the county park in Heber/Overgaard. These two towns were the hardest hit by the fire, and these people were the first evacuated and the last to return home. The people of the area returned home on July 3rd, and the "CASA Lunch" was on Saturday, July 6.

The two towns also managed to put together a parade that same day to thank the fire fighters who worked their butts off to save as many homes as they could. In all, 472 homes were destroyed, but over 3,000 homes were saved.

Dennis Huff, Bruce Pinnell, Roland Regeon, Lyndia Slawson, James Slawson, Sharren Christopherson, Norm Schoenradt, and Travis & Pat Tonzi were the CASA volunteers who cooked and served our free lunch.

When the day was done, over 950 plate lunches were served.

CASA wishes to thank BBQ Smokehouse, Fry's, ISEC Inc, Kalil Bottling, M&M Distributing, Reed Paper Company, Precision Business Forms Co. Inc., Printabilities, Inc., Sands Chevrolet, Sterling Meats, and Willis Itule Produce for their generous donations that helped make this very special event happen.

Through the generosity of the people who attended, an additional \$760.00 was raised on Saturday from donations at the lunch. This money was presented to the Heber/Overgaard Chamber of Commerce and will go towards a fund established for the people in the area who didn't have insurance.

It was very gratifying to do something for a community in need and to do it for free from donations of

time, money and food. Dennis Huff deserves a huge "ATTA BOY" for his idea and unselfishness to lead a charitable cause such as this one.

Pepperdean's Pondering

As many of you already know, I'm running for CASI Executive Director. I'd like to take this opportunity to address why I'm running, what I think the Executive Director should do, and what goals I would like to work toward as your ED.

I'm relatively new as a participant in CASI. My CASI career began with my first cookoff in 1991. That year, I was at the Great Peppers' Meeting in Washington, DC, helping serve dinner on the Mall. I loved the wonderful chili people I met. I had no idea of the political issues, so I was able to focus on the knowledge, experience, friendliness and sense of family that was present. I knew this was something of which I wanted to be a part. Later, I became aware of the business and political side of CASI while listening to the discussions surrounding the Great Peppers' Meeting in Memphis.

I attended my first Great Peppers' Meeting, as Great Pepper of the Mason Dixon Pod, in Asheville, North Carolina in 1997. Asheville was a revelation and an education for me. I did not expect the formality and professionalism of the meeting. As I met delegates and listened to what they had to share, I was truly impressed. To this day, I am still in awe of the wisdom and knowledge that exists out there. I love to sit in on chili discussions and just listen and learn

Since Asheville, I've been doing my small part as a Great Pepper to further the cause. I've worked hard to promote CASI chili, adding twenty plus cookoffs, many new cooks, and lots of energy and enthusiasm in our part of the country. I've also tried to add my voice to CASI issues by lobbying Board members about issues I care about and by serving on the Rules Review Committee. I have gained experience and matured as a CASI citizen. Now I feel ready to do more.

I considered running for the Board of Directors. I decided to run for the position of Executive Director, because I think my strengths are better suited to that position. I thrive on the challenges of how to achieve goals and how to get people working together to achieve those goals. My work experience involves a lot of marketing and working with people. I also work in a leadership position with a couple of very diverse groups. I've been effective at getting the members of these groups to work together successfully toward achieving common goals in an atmosphere of respect, even when disagreements still exist.

We just want our Board to provide leadership by making well-informed decisions.

To achieve this, it is incumbent on all of us to communicate with one another. It's not enough for us all to be working on various issues. We need to share progress reports of how we are dealing with the business of chili as well as provide updates on what we are working on. The AiDE has been a great asset in bringing our community together. We must do even more. We could be well-served by knowing what projects Board members are working on, what Pods are doing to promote CASI, what issues are timely with participants at cookoffs. I want the membership to be informed and knowledgeable about what's going on at the Board level, and I'd like the Board to be empathetic and informed about what is going on throughout the country with the various Pods.

I also see the ED as the person, who, on a day-to-day basis, monitors the business of CASI. I agree with the old adage 'If it ain't broke, don't fix it'. However, we have some challenges and I'd like to be part of the process finding innovative, effective solutions.

Most of all, I see the Executive Director as a spokesperson and advocate for CASI. The ED is the person who should be CASI's head cheerleader in the media. He should take every opportunity to spread the word about the greatness of CASI, all of the fun we have, and all of the good things we do.

There are several issues on my to-do list of projects I would like to pursue as Executive Director. The first would be to find a way to empower more CASI members to enthusiastically contribute their unique talents as part of a cohesive team working for a better CASI. Secondly, I'd like to define a personality for CASI. We're an organization rich in history. Let's incorporate our colorful heritage along with our modern, charitable image to create some marketing pieces that will get the attention of the media and attract more cooks and cookoff organizers to CASI.

I've addressed the concerns, we've all heard, about where cooks are getting older without an influx of younger cooks. We've also witnessed areas with an energy crisis, where the same few people have done all of the work for a long time. Many Pods are ready for revitalization but don't know how to go about it. (Rip) Ripic, writes, "Try filling an electric spice or coffee grinder with coarse sea salt and run the grinder until you have a fine powder. This process will scrub the inside grinder area clean plus absorb most odors from other spices previously ground." Thanks, Richard! And as for the remark that this was your first useful

contribution to CASI, you are wrong....it's your second. Your first was becoming an interested, active CASI member and cook. Now, go forth young man, and learn to sow CASI pepper seeds on the rest of Pennsylvania!

A couple of more gadgets and we will move on. Those of you who have had road nightmares along the Chili Trail, as Earl Who and I have, always carry a pile of tools on the road. One of the neatest items is an electric impact lug wrench that plugs into the cigarette lighter. The cord will usually reach from the car to any of the wheels. For the trailer, we use an extension or use the provided clips for a portable battery. Some people have enough forethought to provide 12-volt plug-ins at different places around their motorhomes. it, and it lifts the other tire next to it off the ground just enough to change it. You can also use it for a wheel chock if needed. Check out your local truck accessories store.

At a local cookoff you never know what to expect. All I am really expecting is to meet people that make and like chili. Most of these once in a while chili cookoffs are nothing more than a

"pot luck" dinner if they are held at a bar or club, etc. Often you find that the "turn-in time" is really the eating and judging time. A show of hands might even determine the winner. The entry fee ranges from nothing to a few dollars; enough to cover a few expenses such as spoons, bowls and napkins for those eating.

I still show up early, set up my table, and cook as at a regular cookoff. There will be a few more cooking using a deep fryer set up and other unique items that replace a Coleman-type stove. My $2\frac{1}{2}$ -quart pot sure looks small compared to the array of big pots that show up. Bottom line is I will get to visit with people, tell them about the upcoming cookoff, have some fun, and get to try some different "stews" or as they call it, CHILI.

During this time I will be talking with people interested in what I am doing—normally they will come by and ask all kinds of questions. This is a chance to explain why you cook chili this way, how much fun a cookoff is, how judging is done at a sanctioned cookoff and certainly a lot more. I also tell them about the "local" cookoff along with the sanctioned cookoff; that does work as they feel they have a chance to win. At the end of the day, there may be a few more people wanting to cook chili in a sanctioned cookoff.

During the past few months of looking for and finding cooks, the host organization is out getting prizes donated. It is time to mail out letters and entry forms announcing the information about the chili cookoff. The letter needs to include (other than the standard cookoff information):

- Other events occurring at the cookoff such as food booths, car show, arts & crafts, etc.
- $3. \ \ Encourage them to bring other friends to cook or just enjoy themselves.$

Some host organizations even include another cooking division to the CASI Division and Local Division. If the host is a fraternal organization, they can have the "Club Division" which would be other like organizations competing for the best chili in that category.

Cliff was in the Hospital in Tulsa, unbeknownst to anyone in attendance, and was to start undergoing tests the following Monday morning. I cannot update you on Cliff's condition, but I am going on the old saying that no news is good news.

No, Cliff not being there did not affect the outcome of the cookoff; neither Harry nor I won, but Cliff was missed and cooks were concerned. It's just like when Johnye puts something in the AiDES about someone in the chili family. It touches each one of us in a certain little way. Be it the loss of a chili cook or the misfortunes of another. I hope that I speak for all of the chili family and CASI that you have a little corner in your heart reserved, as Harry and I do, and it will continue to stay there for the cooks and their families.

Well so much for that. Let's get back to chili. Harry and I talked on the way back from the Oklahoma State Chili Cookoff held in Oklahoma City this past weekend about how competitive chili cooking is becoming. We noticed it last year, but this year seems to be so much more.

Just what do you cook? That is a very good question especially if you are a road cook. What will win one week won't even make final table the next, and really it is not what we are cooking but what the judges want. So how do you get the answer to that Million Dollar Question?

Where has the year gone? It is already August, and the sun is starting to drift more into the southern sky telling me that the days are beginning to get shorter and good ole winter time will soon be upon us. But I don't need anything or anyone to tell me there is not enough time in the day any more. I know the days are not really getting shorter, except for daylight hours; it is just that I am trying to spend more time on projects. By the time you read this, my big item will be to complete the 2002 Missouri State Cookoff. Harry keeps telling me that all he has heard out of me since the first of January is chili! That is all right. All I hear out of him is baseball and the Chicago Cubs.

For all of you who have never been involved in putting on a cookoff, PLEASE GET INVOLVED! Harry and I have been involved in, around, and with cookoffs for several years now, and there is always something new. There are the cookoffs that run themselves, and then there are others that you count the weeks down into days, and days down into hours until it is over and then say a prayer that everything went well.

Putting on a cookoff is a lot more than just getting the CASI packet and returning the paperwork. It doesn't tell you anywhere in the packet that regardless of how hard you try that you are not going to upset someone, or have to bend one of the rules a little (notice I said bend not break), or come up with answers to questions you have not been asked before, or solve big problems.

Here is a quick example that occurred several years ago and involved the Missouri State Chili Cookoff. Everything was going along fine until the morning of the cookoff. Cooks were coming in and the resort, of which I won't mention the name but it is in the Branson area, (you old timers know) told us we couldn't hold the cookoff there. There were no trophies. Now that is a problem.

"Now Director" Preston Nickle and Harry contacted a motel across the road from the original site, talked to the owner who was more than glad to have the cookoff at his motel, and Preston left and came back with trophies; the awards were presented on time.

Another time a problem came up was related to the weather. What started out as one of the most beautiful Saturdays you have ever seen, turned into the worst rainstorm to hit the area of the cookoff in years. So as luck would have it, the town had a National Guard Armory and the cookoff was moved inside with only minor delays. This was before every cook had a canopy under which to cook.

Then there might be small things like the person in charge of registration stayed at the cook's party too long the night before, or the person in charge of veggies for the judging table forgot them and lives 15 miles out in the country. So the next time you pull in a cookoff and something doesn't go just to suit your fancy, just remember what you read in Bess's column. Also before you leave or sometime during the cookoff, tell the person in charge of putting it on "Good Job" even if you have to bite your tongue saying it.

Well, Bess has been on the phone for over an hour so I guess the duties fall on dear ole Harry to finish this out for the month. That lady is always talking; not for sure who to or what this morning but if I was a betting man, I would say it has to do with the Missouri State Chili Cookoff

Reading over column, I see where she talked of how competitive chili cooking is becoming, and I agree with her. I know when I was in office there had to be an answer for everything and that still holds true today in chili cooking. The answer is the judges. In most cases if the cookoff is run correctly and everything goes like it should, all your judges will come from the public and you won't have to use chili cooks.

More times than not, I think chili cooks as judges are too critical, but again at some cookoffs this may be the only way to get enough judges. But back to what is going to win. What the judges like and the best way to find out is to research the area in which you are going to be cooking. If you get in town the day before the cookoff, go to some of the eating places or bars that may serve chili and order a bowl. Look at the menu to see if what they offer may tend to be hot/mild/sweet/a lot of garlic or tomato.

You will be amazed at what information you will gain looking at a menu or talking to local folks. Another thing to remember is that you are not cooking a pot of sit down and eat chili. You are cooking a pot of competition chili that you want to grab the judge's attention with the 1 or 2 spoonfuls that he or she tastes. Leave room to alter your chili in the last 15 or 20 minutes before turn-in. Take time to look at the crowd gathering at the turn-in area, most generally that will be your judges.

How many times have you seen or been a part of this? As turn-in time nears, a cook takes out a spoon of chili and tastes it; this is then repeated maybe 2 or 3 more times including asking other cooks to taste it. This is ok and nothing wrong with it, but again, you are getting the opinion of what another cook's likes and dislikes are and not necessarily what a local judge likes.

The next time you cook, notice how the crowd reacts to your chili if they have give away or tasting cup chili. It won't take long for you to see how your chili is going to rank,

and if they tell you that is the best chili they have ever tasted, you hope they are lying because that is the Kiss of Death.

Always remember that you cannot totally rely on crowd reaction. I know this has happened to most of us — A man or lady comes up and says just put a spoonful in my cup (which is already half full of other cook's chili), stirs your chili in with the rest, and tells you that is really good chili. I think I got the answer to Bess's Million Dollar Question. Let the crowd sample as we are cooking, and then we will know what the local judges are going to like and dislike.

Chili cooking might be sort of slow for the rest of the month, as Bess just walked out the door to pay bills. The good thing is we didn't put as many names in the hat this month. That is the way we pay our bills. We put all the accounts in a hat and then draw out, and if anyone gives us a hard time from the month before, we won't put their name in the hat.

From the big clock on the wall it looks like it is time for Precious and I to go to Doggie School, so until next month; thank you for your time until next time and remember start slow and then taper off.

Announcement of Candidacy

I announce my being a candidate for the CASI Board of Directors at the Great Peppers meeting in Arizona this September.

Our organization needs to consider policy/programs in the coming year(s) to insure continued development and to increase growth in our membership. Some area's that need consideration are:

- 1. The Board of Directors. Currently we have 10 elected board members and the Executive Director (also elected) who also serves as a member of the board. I propose that CASI be divided into 4 Regions (East, West, Central and Southwest for example). Each Region would have an elected member to the Board of Directors, and the remaining six be elected as "members at large". This would provide for diversified representation on the Board of Directors. The Executive Director position would not change as for term of office and method of election.
- 2. CASI Pods Are we hindering POD leadership and development by requiring that the GREAT PEPPER or authorized alternate POD officer or incoming officer of the same shall attend the annual Great Peppers Meeting? PODS have members that could fill these positions and do an outstanding job, but do not run because they may not be able to attend the Great Peppers meeting for one of several reasons (work, vacation time, money, etc). Allowing the PODS to have a "voting delegate" would eliminate this situation and allow for more members to be involved in their POD Offices. For the PODS who do not have money to give their POD Officer to attend, their elections would not be based in part on "Who has the time and can afford to go or who is going anyways"
- 3. RULES Rules and changes to the rules will always be part of the organization. What we need to do is to standardize how the current rules and future rule changes are applied. Currently rules are applied as the person who is the appointed referee applies them based on what they think the rule means. CASI needs a "Referee" to interpret rules, make decisions and then insure this information is provided down the line. Example: If a cup contains half chili grind and half cut is this a marked cup? Right now the answer is probably 50/50 among our Regional & Area Referee's. We need to have an answer YES or NO from CASI and that is how this situation would be applied.
- 4. New Individual Memberships We have a lot of work to do in this area. This is the area that has the biggest impact on what CASI will be ten years from now. We need to develop a solid membership program to assist the current members and PODS with recruiting new members.

I have background experience that will serve me well on the Board of Directors This includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Past Commander of an American Legion Post. Recognized at State and National level for outstanding new membership recruiting during that year.
- 2. Awarded "Elk of the Year" in 1973 in New Hampshire.
- Retired with 27 years in the United States Army. Last assignment was Sergeant Major, Army Recruiting Command covering 13 states with 1500 recruiters assigned.
- Certified Basketball Referee for high school and college. Certified Soccer Referee for high school, college and professional soccer. President of Indiana High School Soccer Officials Association, 1978. State Rules Interpreter for the Indiana State Chapter of the International Association of Approved Basketball Officials from 1975 to 1979.
- Chapter Chairman for the Non-Commissioned Officers Association at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, 1986 & 1987, which raised thousands of dollars yearly for charity.
- 6. Included in the Jaycee's annual publication of "Outstanding Young Men in America" in 1979.
- 7. Graduated from Columbia College, Columbia, Mo with a BA Degree in 1975 and Indiana State University with a Masters Degree in 1979.







A View from the Top of an Old Chilihead

Before we start on any chili history, let me share some useful information with those of you who discover things as slowly as I do. It's not that we are slow; we have our priorities in order

If you have been cooking chili for a while, you probably have some of those 5-gallon propane bottles that have the wrong

valves on them. On April 1st the old ones became obsolete. I went to the propane store and had the bottle to my grill changed and they charged me \$40.00. Later found out I could have bought a new bottle at Wal Mart, with a new valve, for \$21.95. I also found out that Wal Mart would exchange your old bottle for a full bottle of propane for their regular exchange price and give you a full bottle with the new valve for only a \$4.00 upcharge. I now have several bottles of propane with shiny new valves. Probably enough for the next five chili cooking years.

A Little Chili History about the first Great Peppers Meeting or Conference, a.k.a. the Pepper Seed Summit. I have written several times in the Goat Gap and the Alamo Area Pod Newsletter about what transpired at the meeting. But, I have never mentioned the people in attendance. These were the only people present, except for some of Paul's hired ranch hands. No one else was invited, and we stuck with the "by invitation only". There was so much controversy and anger around chili at that time that we did not want a lot of people. We did not have time for a lot of arguing and fighting. This meeting went better than expected, and we did let in a few people the next year and opened it up in 1982 to anyone wanting to attend as a spectator.

A Regional Referee at that time was completely different from what a Regional Referee is today. Then, they were the right hand men of the Directors. They participated in most of the Directors meetings and had input, but no vote. Example: Vann York helped me in putting the first rules together for publication and Richard Knight designed the CASI Logo we still use today.

Until next time, I will see you on the trail to Terlingua.
